## SSCWQC Member Reports

- Hofmann- The hay crop is 1/3 of what it should have been, due to the lack of rain.
- Tuthill- Local area is very dry however, as you move west you see improvement in crops. With high winds you can see the downfall of vertical till.
- Carlson- Crops and new trees are looking great. We are seeing the peak of emerald ash borer infestations.
- Ellis- Presented to a 2<sup>nd</sup> grade classroom on the benefits of cover crops. Working with the Common Grounds group doing a Farm to Fork tour.
- Miller- NW Iowa got a good amount of rain, with that, you could really see the benefit of no-till practices.
- Bormann- Discussed the sociological issue of "how farmers make decisions".
